(1) This analysis includes 55 of the 58 donors who pledged at the NY conference. InterAction, the Red Cross movement, and UNASUR have been excluded from this analysis due to reporting difficulties related to their structures as member-based organizations. (3) This analysis is based on the calendar year. Donors used different fiscal years to make their pledges, as listed on [www.haitispecialenvoy.org](http://www.haitispecialenvoy.org). Most donors used the calendar year (January 1 - December 31). Five donors - Australia (June 30), Canada (March 31), IMF (September 30), Japan (March 31) and the US (September 30) - used different fiscal years. The Office of the Special Envoy has attempted to harmonize donor pledges based on the calendar year.

(4) The pledges made at the New York donors' conference cover different time periods. This column indicates the final year of the pledge made by each donor at the New York donors' conference.

(5) As part of their pledges at the New York donors conference some donors reprogrammed funds that were already allocated to Haiti in multiyear development programs.

(6) The Office of the Special Envoy has estimated the end year of the OAS pledge based on an annual allocation of \$18 million.

(7) No update was received by the Office of the Special Envoy about the contributions of these donors. The OSE has assumed that these donors intended to make the contribution that they pledged at the New York donors conference in the 2010 calendar year.
